Listening to the Heart's Cry - Mdm Tan's Story

Mdm Tan (real name hidden for privacy) is 60 years old, and she suffers from a stroke in her left frontal lobe. She has a close-knit family and they keep to themselves. Her husband, the sole breadwinner of the family, is 54 years old and works as an odd-job labourer. They have an adopted daughter, a 12 year old who requires close supervision. Mdm Tan was a cheerful and humorous homemaker who held the family's purse strings.

Following her stroke, she became distressed by her loss of mobility, and frustrated over her difficulty in speaking. Her husband had to stop working to support her, and eventually, they depleted their savings. Being the caregiver took a toll on him and he became easily irritable and short-tempered. Mdm Tan soon began to experience mood swings and disorientation, and wanted to end her own life. Her situation was made worse as they did not have many friends they could turn to for help.

When she was admitted to the care facility, Mdm Tan would often scream and ramble on about something, but the care staff could not make sense of what she was saying. One day, Senior Chaplain Tan Bee Ker spent half an hour interacting with her and felt disappointed at not being able to help her





predicament. However, deep in her heart, she sensed Mdm Tan had something significant to say. So, she went back and spent more time with her, giving her full attention to Mdm Tan. It soon became clear that Mdm Tan was saying that it pained her heart to see her husband acting out his frustration by scolding their only daughter and that she wished someone could help convey her feelings to her husband. When Bee Ker said she would help convey her plea to her husband, Mdm Tan became visibly relaxed and calm. There was peace in the household for the rest of the day and the evening.

Since then, Mdm Tan started to call Bee Ker her friend. Mdm Tan had also started to speak more coherently and her mood visibly improved. This in turn had a positive effect on her husband who became calmer and more positive.

About SLEC Pastoral Care and Church Partnerships

The Pastoral Care and Church Partnerships team works closely with church partners to provide spiritual and emotional support to elders, their caregivers, and staff. The support includes being present and journeying with the person to restore the wholeness of the body, soul, and spirit, strengthening resilience in managing life's complexities and challenges, and helping to resolve vital relationship issues. The team complements SLEC's multidisciplinary team of clinicians and care specialists in caring wholly for those in need.

PCCP's activities include personal pastoral care and counselling, leading chapel services, consulting with church partners on engagement activities at SLEC facilities, organising various dedication services, and holding organisation-wide Easter and Christmas celebrations.

SLEC Church Partnerships aims to establish a community of church partners in jointly providing pastoral care to elders, caregivers, and staff and to support SLEC's work, grow the partnerships with churches, and raise awareness of SLEC as a ministry partner and a ministry equipper in eldercare to churches.

Full Gospel Assembly

Full Gospel Assembly started partnering with SLEC Residence@Ang Mo Kio towards the end of 2020 amidst the changing environmental conditions and safe distancing rules as Singapore grappled with the COVID pandemic.

On Saturday, 12 November 2022, we had the honour of hosting the inaugural Remembrance Service for families of residents who had passed away in the previous months at SLEC Residence@Ang Mo Kio. It was an opportunity for us to come together with caregivers and family members and share treasured memories of the deceased.

The beginning of the Remembrance Service included "Voice from the Heart," a letter-writing activity for grieving family members intended to help their loved ones find closure. We then watched a tribute video, read poems, and heard from both family and staff members.

A candle-lighting ceremony marked the conclusion of the service and served to remind us of the love and memories of our elders. Each of the families received a rainbow flower that was specially prepared by our residents and students in solidarity with those who had passed.

The families and care staff were moved to tears as we celebrated the lives of the elders we once loved and cared for. Despite the event being emotional, we felt comforted and experienced an inevitable sense of peace.
